The Toledo Gem and Rockhound Board Meeting Minutes

February 10, 2017

6:30 p.m. in the Craft Center

Attendance: Cathy Clevenz, Debra Hoffmaster, Elie Ghanime, Chester King, Sr., Harold Burleson, Kathy Petersen, Tom Barnhizer, Steve Shimatzki, Michelle Grigore

Secretary Report- Michelle presented the report.

MOTION- Deb made a motion to approve the report as presented and Tom seconded. The vote was unanimous.

Treasurer's Report – Michelle presented the January financials (attached to these minutes).

MOTION: Tom made a motion to accept the report and Elie seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

FOLLOW UP: Cathy asked about the annual audit and Michelle reported that it would be completed this weekend, and sent to the Board in writing before the Feb. Club Meeting as prescribed in Club By-laws.

Old Business:

Need for a Secretary – Julia Gehring was asked to be Secretary for the club, but declined. Her father Fritz, said he would be a substitute Secretary as needed but did not want the appointment as regular Secretary. Michelle brought up Joe Motter, who was very active in the club and currently functions as Sunshine Chair. Many agreed that he would be a good choice. The Board also discussed purchasing a recording device to help document Club meetings.

MOTION: Steve made a motion for the club to purchase a recording device for the purpose of taking minutes/recording Club meeting business. Michelle seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

FOLLOW UP: Cathy will ask Joe if he would serve in the Secretary's position.

Club Policies: Michelle and Steve have been reviewing the Rocky Readers from 20016 – 2016 for any policies or procedures brought forward to the membership. Discussion involved the policies and procedures found thus far. No action was taken.

By-laws Update: Tom reported that the committee has been formed and they have a copy of the Dec. 2014 By-laws, passed by the Club members in Jan. 2015. Discussion included items to be changed or included in those by-laws, which Tom took note of. He expects to have a draft to the Board in March or April.

Geode Cracker for Teacher: The teacher was put in touch with Ed about purchasing a used geode cracker for her classroom. In the meantime, she rented a soil pipe and completed the activities for this year. No action was taken.

New Business:

Teen Programming: Tom noted that the Midwest Federation has curriculum for a youth program and wanted Board discussion about increasing youth participation in the club. Discussion ensued with history of the Girl Scout program that Chet ran until the Cincinnati Headquarters of Girl Scouts declined to allow the Toledo Chapter to participate about 3 years ago. The existing Juniors Program was created to function like the Midwest Federation model, with adjustments for the interests of the group. Steve is currently the Junior Moderator. Tom felt that we should reach out to scouting and youth groups to get more youth involved. The Board agreed that this would be a good thing, but no formal action was taken.

Show and Tell: Cathy noted that the club used to have a member Show and Tell session during some meetings and she would like to bring that back. Tom organizes the programs for Club Meetings and members of the Board suggested that summer would be a good time to reinstate Show and Tell. The Club also held a cabochon cutting contest that would be fun to run again. Holding light-hearted "ugliest rock" contests or other competitions was also discussed. The goal is to allow members to shine, to get to know each other better and to bring fun and levity to Club Meetings.

Craft Center Cleaning: Cathy noted the condition of the floor and oil on surfaces; she would like a cleaner presentation during the weekly Open Hours that Toledo Botanical Gardens is asking of every Resident Organization. Discussion ensued about the fact that this was a work shop and would have oil and rock dust and metal shavings each week. The Board generally agreed that an epoxy floor put over the tiles (with a roughening surface agent) would be the best option.

FOLLOW UP: Cathy and/or Tom will get TBG's permission to alter the floor first.

Guidelines for Open Houses: The Open House Chair arranges all the vendors and logistics for two "shows" a year in TBG's Conference Center. Vendors and the club raffles help cover the cost of these Open Houses. The current Chair, Nancy Grove, has guidelines in place where no more than 30% of the items were non-club related. Spouses of members are permitted to bring their crafts and sell along with their member Husbands or Wives. This was implemented to enhance the family feel of the Club. Those Open House policies are in the handbook given to the President. No action was taken.

Doors and Locks ; There was general discussion about the keypad door lock and the concern that people were entering the Craft Center outside of posted work sessions, classes and workshops. Several times items were moved or lights left on. It was suggested that a keypad system that records who has entered and when might help; but many felt the cost was too great and no equipment has been stolen. Discussion turned to the back door and the need to upgrade to a compliant fire exit door.

MOTION: Tom made a motion to place a work order with TBG to replace the door with one compliant with fire codes. Elie seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

Stranahan Festival and Village: Steve brought up the Stranahan's offer to have TGRC run the Artist Village May 20-21. Discussion ensued about the fact that twenty vendors would have to be secured with each paying \$100 to \$150 for a 10' x10' space. Several Board members felt this was too much work and money. The proposal also called for using our logo and calling it the Toledo Gem and Rockhound Artist Village- which several Board members objected to because of the difficulty and likelihood of low vendor sales. The sentiment of a majority of the Board was that we don't want to spearhead this, but we could certainly help publicize the need for vendors to members and others.

Bugfest – The Board also discussed the request to participate in Bugfest in August at Secor Metropark. It is a family event focused on insects and hosts booths from local organizations. Several Board members felt there was little likelihood of vendor sales and no direct connection to Club mission.

Personal Notice of Board Meetings : the last item of discussion was the need to send Board Members personal emails of the date/time of Board meetings because the Rocky Reader notice was buried. Cathy agreed this would be done.

MOTION: Elie made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 7:57 p.m. and Tom seconded. The meeting was adjourned.

February 15, 2017
7:00 p.m. TBG Conference Center

There were 30 members present: the Membership Chair has the sign-in sheet

The meeting began with a 25 min. presentation by Tom Marok on Fossil Park and the Devonian Age fossils to be found in our area.

Secretary's report: The minutes from Jan. were sent in the Rocky Reader as noted by acting secretary, Michelle Grigore. **Tom Marok made a motion to accept the minutes as presented, Steve Schmatzki seconded and the motion passed unianimously.**

Treasurer's report: Michelle G. presented the audit report from 2015 to the members; past Treasurer Pete Petersen made the job very easy and kept excellent books. Written copies were available at the meeting. **Tom M. made a motion to accept the audit as presented, Steve S. seconded and the motion passed unanimously.**

Michelle then reported out the Jan. 1-31 financials; a written summary report was available to members and the full Quickbooks report given to the Board at their Feb. meeting. **Katherine Smarkle made a motion to accept the Treasurer's report as preented, Elie G. seconded and the motion passed unanimously.**

Michelle presented the 2017 budget (copies were available for all members). Steve S. noted that McCaw's was renewing their Rocky Reader ad, so the income line for that would be \$60 higher than on the budget. **Tonia motioned to accept the budget as presented, Steve S. seconded and the motion passed unanimously.**

Old Business:

Open Houses for 2017 – President Clevens confirmed the May 6 and Nov. 11 dates in the TBG Conference Center. Nancy is the Open House Chair and has established guidelines that include 60% or more of the items must be club-related. Spouses can bring other items for sale. To arrange for a table at an Open House, please contact Nancy or Catherine C. More information will be in the Rocky Reader.

Saturday TBG Open Hours – As required by our 2017 lease, the club has been keeping the Craft Center open on Saturdays, but no members of the public have been in to visit. Discussion centered on the isolation of the Craft Center from the rest of the Garden and lack of signs directing people to the site.

By-Law Update – Tom noted that the committee has guidelines and is reviewing the existing by-laws with a goal to have them to the club in April. Some articles will be reorganized and a few formatting changes are in the works.

Officer Meeting with TBG – Tom and Cathy met with Executive Director Karen and covered the need to fix the back fire exit of the Craft Center and the flooding in the parking lot. Karen said TBG would look into the door issue and had little recourse for the flooding except to look at drainage additions. Paving was not financially possible. With the demolition of the old caretaker house, the parking for the Craft Center may move to that site and make flooding less of an issue.

New Business:

Doors and Locks – President Clevens has been busy changing the Craft Center codes and Annex locks to reduce incidents of unauthorized use. She will issue the door codes and keys to those who need them.

Reinstating Show and Tell and Other Club Activities – To further comraderie, knowledge of members and add levity to club meetings, Cathy would like to bring back Show and Tell sessions, rock ID, Ugly Rock and Cabochon Competitions or other novel things that promote a closer bond. Club members agreed this would be fun and were on board. Tom will be implementing this through monthly meetings outside of the annual potluck and auctions.

Girl Scout Activity Guide for Leaders – It costs just \$35 to advertise in the GS of Western Lake Erie scout activity guide, which reaches 55,000 girls. **Members agreed this was money well spent, so Steve S. made a motion to approve this expenditure, Tom M. seconded and the motion passed unanimously.**

Reports:

TBG Liaison – The club needs volunteers for the Garden's Feb. 25th Seed Swap and Plant Sale on Mother's Day. As part of our lease, the TGRC is required to give volunteer hours to the Gardens.

Gem Crafters – JOINT GEM CRAFTER / METALCRAFT WORK SESSION. Terri, Steve and the Metalcraft members will be joining us again on Wednesday, March 8 during our regular meeting time from 6:15 to 9:00 pm. Trained members can work on our equipment or in the Metalcraft area or both if you choose. Visitors are always welcome.

Jade (Jadeite – Nephrite)

Jade is the name used to describe either of two hard, dense, usually green gemstones. The more highly prized of the two is **Jadeite** -- the other is **Nephrite**. Both jadestones take a high polish. Both have been carved into jewelry, ornaments, small sculptures and tools from the earliest recorded times.

Jadeite and nephrite differ in both crystalline structure and chemical composition. In both minerals, the microscopic crystals are tightly interlocked to form a compact aggregate. Jadeite is a silicate of sodium and aluminum and is classed as a **pyroxene**. Nephrite is a silicate of calcium and magnesium belonging to the **amphibole** group of minerals; it is usually called a form of **Tremolite**.

Both jadestone types may be white or colorless, but may occur as red, green, brown, purple, yellow or gray due to the presence of iron, chromium or manganese. There are also wide variations of

translucency in both minerals. The most highly prized variety is jadeite of an emerald-green hue. The two different types of jadestones, when worked and polished, can be distinguished by their appearance. The luster of polished nephrite is oily; that of jadeite is glassy. Some colors are also specific to one mineral or the other. The popular emerald-green jewelry jades are usually jadeite. The main source of gem-quality jadeite is northern Myanmar (Burma). Nephrite occurrence is more geographically widespread, including North America. [*Jade (or more commonly Nephrite) has been found along the Northwest coast of North America in rivers, beaches and in geologic formations; sometimes as cobbles and occasionally in megalithic blocks. Rockhound collectors are often rewarded with jadeite stones in remote beaches of Oregon following major storms. The Inuit peoples of Alaska have used Jade for ornaments and jewelry for a millennium.*]

Because both jadestones are hard, tough and keep a good edge, they were fashioned into tools by Neolithic peoples in many parts of the world. The best-known finds are from the lake dwellings of Switzerland, western France and China. When stone-based Neolithic cultures were succeeded by those bronze and iron, jade gradually lost its value in all but a few regions of the world.

Jade and jade carving are associated predominantly with the Chinese, who, from the Neolithic period, were carving jade into tools and simple cult objects in the form of flat donut-shaped disks. Nowhere else has jade been worked with such skill in such a long and unbroken tradition. For thousands of years, the Chinese carved only nephrite from within its own provinces. Not until the 18th century, did they begin to work jadeite when large quantities began entering the country from Myanmar.

The Aztecs, Mayas and other Native American peoples of Mexico and Central America carved jadeite for use as ornaments, amulets and badges of rank. Nearly all of these Meso-American jades are of various shades of green, with emerald green the most highly prized color among the Aztecs. The appreciation of jade died out in Meso-America after the Spanish conquest in the 16th century.

Several varieties of the mineral serpentine resemble nephrite and are sometimes sold as such, but they can be distinguished by their relative softness. Another deceptive practice is that of dyeing colorless pieces of jade green to simulate high-quality stone.
